Mrs. Billie Joan Dawson, age 92, of Jefferson City, MO, passed away Monday, November 21, 2022, at home surrounded by her loving family.

Stewart. She grew up in Mexico on their family farm. Billie graduated from Mexico High School in 1947 and was a 1949 graduate of Jefferson City Junior College.

Billie married James Horace "Jim" Dawson on November 27, 1951, in Harrison, AR. She was employed with the Missouri Bar, Missouri Department of Corrections, and the Missouri Department of Conservation. Jim preceded her in death on February 22, 1974. Following the death of her husband, Billie balanced caring for her six children, and managing the family's real estate business.
